

The Value of Pony Club

How Horse And Life Skills Are Built Into Its Program

Cathy Frederickson is the current Regional Instruction Coordinator (RIC) for the Virginia Region Pony Clubs and a Level IV National Examiner. Frederickson joined Pony Club in California at age seven and graduated at the A level. She lived in England and pursued her BHSI exam as well as worked for Bayberry Farm in NH and Denny Emerson in Vermont. She and her husband have lived in Boyce Va. for 30 years where she has competed, teaches, and trains.

Why should parents put their child in Pony Club today?

Over the years, I've heard many former Pony Club members say that their college interview, doctoral presentation, or that really big job interview would not have gone as well without the poise and verbal skills they honed in Pony Club. Yes, we teach children to ride and take care of their ponies, but they learn so much more. A few years ago Pony Club created a Horsemasters Membership for anyone over age 18, so you don't have to be a child anymore to take advantage of this program.

How does Pony Club teach these skills?

Pony Club members are prepped and tested on their riding and horse management skills. At every Pony Club activity members are encouraged to engage with their peers, instructors, and examiners orally. They discuss their training skills and horse management knowledge.

Members are taught to express opinions, explore alternative theories, and examine philosophies.

How long does this training take?

The United States Pony Clubs (USPC) program begins at the "D" level and progresses through a series of tests (called "certifications") to the top tier, or "A" level. "A" level alumni are recognized around the world for their expertise and are often found running barns and riding programs at the highest levels. Pony Club tries to have all members educated through the "C" level, giving them the skills necessary to own and manage a small barn. On average, students take one to two years between

Can any instructor conduct these tests?

Certifications are conducted by Examiners, trained in the Pony Club program. Examiners use Pony Club approved Standards of Proficiency at each certification level. At the lower levels, local examiners are used by the local clubs and centers during half or full day testing sessions. At the upper levels, National Examiners, trained to a higher standard, are used for 1-2 day certifications which are organized by the national office.

Can you give us an example of how you go about training a student orally?

A unique feature of Pony Club is that Horse Management is completely integrated into all aspects of Pony Club. We start every lesson, testing and competition with an inspection of the Pony Club member's attire, tack and pony. This inspection starts with the member introducing his or herself and her pony. At the lowest level, a member would say, "Good morning! My name is Suzy Q and this is my pony, Flash. I'm a D2 with XYZ Pony Club and Flash is a 9 year-old mare, who does not like to have her tummy touched. Otherwise, she has excellent ground manners..." As the member progresses through the certifications this introduction evolves into a conversation. Through horsemanship, Pony Club instructors, Examiners and Horse Management judges work with each individual member to

skills and effective application of those skills.

What are other benefits to membership?

There are many benefits to membership but a few can be summed up by the Pony Club motto: "Sportsmanship, Stewardship and Leadership through Horsemanship." We value each of these character traits. Our more highly certified members mentor and teach the lower certified ones. All of our competitions are in teams to build organizational skills and learn to function in a group. Stewardship requirements in the form of Land Conservation are included at many certification levels.

We offer awards recognition for sportsmanship and horse management. And, we offer opportunities for our members to be ambassadors Pony Club nationally and internationally through exchange programs and other activities.

How can people learn more about a club or center near them?

The Virginia Region Pony Clubs is the regional organization that supports the 10 local clubs and two riding centers in Northern Virginia, from Richmond to Arlington (https://vrponyclub.org/ clubs-centers). The region's membership coordinator (VRPCmembership@gmail. com) can help parents figure out which clubs or centers they should consider based on geography and shared interests.

registered prefix can be used only by the breeder to whom it is registered or with his written permission. It is not proper to drop a registered prefix from a pony's name without the written permission of the breeder.

When a registered pony changes ownership, it is important for this transfer to be recorded in the VPBA registry. The registration certificate with a Transfer of Ownership form signed by the last recorded owner should be submitted to the VPBA office. Ponies properly transferred and registered with VPBA are eligible for participation in a variety of award programs at the local, state, and national level. One such program is a monetary grant from the Virginia Horse Industry Board. Many of the nation's best are registered Virginia breds. winning championships and high score awards at every prestigious hunter pony event in the USA.

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
